We have performed the procedures enumerated below on the Pike County Agricultural Society's (the Society) receipts, disbursements and balances recorded in the cash basis accounting records for the years ended November 30, 2022 and 2021 and certain compliance requirements related to those transactions and balances, included in the information provided to us by the management of the Society. The Society is responsible for the receipts, disbursements and balances recorded in the cash basis accounting records for the years ended November 30, 2022 and 2021 and certain compliance requirements related to these transactions and balances included in the information provided to us by the Society.

The Board Members and the management of the Society have agreed to and acknowledged that the procedures performed are appropriate to meet the intended purpose of providing assistance in the evaluation of the Society's receipts, disbursements and balances recorded in their cash-basis accounting records for the years ended November 30, 2022 and 2021, and certain compliance requirements related to these transactions and balances. No other party acknowledged the appropriateness of the procedures. This report may not be suitable for any other purpose. The procedures performed may not address all the items of interest to a user of the report and may not meet the needs of all users of the report and, as such, users are responsible for determining whether the procedures performed are appropriate for their purposes. The sufficiency of the procedures is solely the responsibility of the parties specified in the report. Consequently, we make no representation regarding the sufficiency of the procedures described below either for the purpose for which this report has been requested or for any other purpose.

For the purposes of performing these procedures, this report only describes exceptions exceeding \$10.

The procedures and the associated findings are as follows:

Cash

- 1. We recalculated the November 30, 2022 and November 30, 2021 bank reconciliations. We found no exceptions.
- 2. We agreed the December 1, 2020 beginning fund balances for each opinion unit recorded to the November 30, 2020 balances in the prior year audited statements. We found no exceptions. We also agreed the December 1, 2021 beginning fund balances for each fund recorded to the November 30, 2021 balances. We found no exceptions.
- 3. We agreed the 2022 and 2021 bank reconciliation as of November 30, 2022 and 2021 to the total fund cash balances reported in the General Ledger Report and the financial statements filed by the Society in the Hinkle System. The November 30, 2021 ending fund balance reported in the Hinkle System financial statements was overstated by \$743. This overstatement was corrected when compiling the November 30, 2022 Financial Statements by the Society.

- 4. We confirmed the November 30, 2022 bank account balance with the Society's financial institution. We found no exceptions. We also agreed the confirmed balances to the amounts appearing in the November 30, 2022 bank reconciliation without exception.
- 5. We selected five reconciling debits (such as outstanding checks) from the November 30, 2022 bank reconciliation:
 - a. We traced three of the five debits to the subsequent December bank statement. We found the other two debits had yet to be cashed. These checks remained on the bank reconciliation for over six months. The Society voided these checks in August 2023.
 - b. We traced the amounts and dates to the check register and determined the debits were dated prior to November 30. We found no exceptions.
- 6. We selected all reconciling credits (such as deposits in transit) from the November 30, 2022 bank reconciliation:
 - a. The Society had one reconciling credit that had yet to be deposited in the amount of \$1,800 as of November 31, 2022. The credit had remained on the reconciliation for over six months. The Society voided the debit in August 2023.
 - b. We agreed the credit amounts to the General Ledger and determined they were dated prior to November 30. We found no exceptions.

Intergovernmental and Other Confirmable Cash Receipts

- 1. We selected a total of five receipts from the Distribution Transaction Detail Report (State DTL) and the County Auditor's Audit Trail by Vendor from 2022 and a total of five from 2021.
 - a. We compared the amount from the above named reports to the amount recorded in the Deposit Detail Report. The amounts agreed.
 - b. We inspected the Deposit Detail Report to determine these receipts were allocated to the proper account codes. We found no exceptions.
 - c. We inspected the Deposit Detail Report to determine whether the receipts were recorded in the proper year. We found no exceptions.

Admission/Grandstand Receipts

We selected two days of admission/grandstand cash receipts from the year ended November 30, 2022 and two days of admission/grandstand cash receipts from the year ended November 30, 2021 recorded in the Deposit Detail Report and agreed the receipt amount to the supporting documentation (ticket recapitulation sheets/cash register tapes, etc.). The amounts agreed.

Privilege Fee Receipts

We selected 10 privilege fee cash receipts from the year ended November 30, 2022 and 10 privilege fee cash receipts from the year ended November 30, 2021 recorded in the duplicate cash receipts book and:

- a. Agreed the receipt amount to the amount recorded in the General Ledger. The amounts agreed.
- b. Agreed the rate charged with rates in force during the period. There was one receipt that did not have the supporting documentation of the rates in force in the amount of \$468. However, because we did not inspect all Privilege Fee receipts, our report provides no assurance regarding whether or not other similar errors occurred.
- c. Inspected the General Ledger to determine whether the receipt was recorded in the proper year. We found no exceptions.

Rental Receipts

We selected 10 rental cash receipts from the year ended November 30, 2022 and 10 rental cash receipts from the year ended November 30, 2021 recorded in the duplicate cash receipts book and:

- a. Agreed the receipt amount to the amount recorded in the Deposit Detail Report. The amounts agreed.
- b. Agreed the rate charged with rates in force during the period. We found no exceptions.
- c. Inspected the Deposit Detail Report to determine whether the receipt was recorded in the proper year. We found no exceptions.

Sustaining and Entry (Purse) Receipts and Disbursements

We obtained copies of race schedules approved by the Board Members. We selected both race days from the year ended November 30, 2022 and both race days from the year ended November 30, 2021 and performed the following procedures:

- a. The Society utilizes funding received from Ohio Horseman Association, Entry Fees, and Ohio Fair Funding for purse expenditures. We traced these revenues to the Society's General Ledger Report. We found no exceptions.
- b. Traced authorized race dates to the cash disbursement ledger postings and determined whether there were purse disbursement postings for each authorized race day. The cash disbursements ledger reported wagering disbursements for the authorized dates.

Other Receipts

We selected 10 other receipts from the year ended November 30, 2022 and:

- a. Agreed the receipt amount recorded in the Deposit Detail Report to supporting documentation. The amounts agreed.
- b. Confirmed the amounts charged complied with rates in force during the period. We found no exceptions.
- c. Inspected the Deposit Detail Report to determine the receipt was posted to the proper fund, and was recorded in the proper year. We found no exceptions.

Debt

- 1. The prior audit documentation disclosed no debt outstanding as of November 30, 2020.
- 2. We inquired of management and inspected the receipt and expenditure records for evidence of loan or credit agreements, and bonded, note, County, or mortgage debt issued during 2022 or 2021 or debt payment activity during 2022 or 2021. There were no new debt issuances, nor any debt payment activity during 2022 or 2021.

Non-Payroll Cash Disbursements

- 1. We selected 10 disbursements from the General Ledger for the year ended November 30, 2022 and 10 from the year ended November 30, 2021 and determined whether:
 - a. The disbursements were for a proper public purpose. We found no exceptions.
 - b. The check number, date, payee name and amount recorded on the returned, canceled check agreed to the check number, date, payee name and amount recorded in the General Ledger Report and to the names and amounts on the supporting invoices. We found no exceptions.
 - c. Based on the nature of the expenditure, the account coding is reasonable. We found no exceptions.

Sunshine Law Compliance

- 1. We obtained and inspected the Society's Public Records Policy to determine the policy was in accordance with Ohio Rev. Code §§ 149.43(E)(2) and 149.43(B)(7)(c) and did not limit the number of responses that may be made to a particular person, limit the number of responses during a specified period of time, or establish a fixed period of time before it will respond unless that period is less than eight hours. We found no exceptions.
- 2. We inquired with Society management and determined that the Society did not have any completed, denied public records requests or public records requests with redactions during the engagement period.
- 3. We inquired whether the Society had a records retention schedule and observed that it was readily available to the public as required by Ohio Rev. Code § 149.43(B)(2). We found no exceptions.
- 4. We inspected written evidence that the Public Records Policy was provided to the records custodian/manager as required by Ohio Rev. Code § 149.43(E)(2). We found no exceptions.
- 5. We inquired with Society management and determined that the Society did not have a policy manual during the engagement period therefore the public records policy could not be included as required by Ohio Rev. Code § 149.43(E)(2).
- 6. We inquired with Society management and determined that the Society did not have a public records poster displayed during the engagement period as required by Ohio Rev. Code §149.43(E)(2).
- We inquired with Society management and determined that the Society did not have any applications for record disposal submitted to the Records Commission during the engagement period
- 8. We inquired with Society management and determined that the Society did not have any elected officials subject to the Public Records Training requirements during the engagement period as required by Ohio Rev. Code §§ 149.43(E)(1) and 109.43(B).
- 9. We inspected the public notices for the public meetings held during the engagement period and determined the Society notified the general public and news media of when and where meetings during the engagement period were to be held as required by Ohio Rev. Code § 121.22(F). We found no exceptions.
- 10. We inspected the minutes of public meetings during the engagement period in accordance with Ohio Rev. Code § 121.22(C) and determined whether they were:
 - a. Prepared a file is created following the date of the meeting
 - b. Filed placed with similar documents in an organized manner
 - c. Maintained retained, at a minimum, for the engagement period
 - d. Open to public inspection available for public viewing or request.

We found no exceptions.

- 11. We inspected the minutes from the engagement period in accordance with Ohio Rev. Code § 121.22(G) and determined the following:
 - a. Executive sessions were only held at regular or special meetings.
 - b. The purpose for the meetings and going into an executive session (when applicable) correlated with one of the matters listed in Ohio Rev. Code § 121.22(G).
 - c. Formal governing board actions were adopted in open meetings.

We found no exceptions.

Other Compliance

1. Ohio Rev. Code § 117.38 requires Societies to file their financial information in the HINKLE system within 60 days after the close of the fiscal year. This statute also permits the Auditor of State to extend the deadline for filing a financial report and establish terms and conditions for any such extension. Auditor of State established policies, regarding the filing of complete financial statements, as defined in AOS Bulletin 2015-007 in the Hinkle System. We confirmed the Society filed their complete financial statements, as defined by AOS Bulletin 2015-007 and Auditor of State established policy within the allotted timeframe for the years ended November 30, 2022 and 2021 in the Hinkle system. We found no exceptions.

We were engaged by the Society to perform this agreed-upon procedures engagement and conducted our engagement in accordance with the attestation standards established by the AICPA and Comptroller General of the United States' *Government Auditing Standards*. We were not engaged to, and did not conduct an examination, or review engagement, the objective of which would be the expression of an opinion or conclusion, respectively, on the Society's receipts, disbursements, balances and compliance with certain laws and regulations. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion or conclusion. Had we performed additional procedures, other matters might have come to our attention that would have been reported to you.

We are required to be independent of the Society and to meet our ethical responsibilities, in accordance with the ethical requirements established by the Comptroller General of the United States' *Government Auditing Standards* related to our agreed upon procedures engagement.
